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Annual Report

Information about the Foundation

The Right Livelihood Award Foundation is a Swedish non-profit Foundation known internationally for presenting the Right Livelihood Awards to individuals and organisations offering practical and exemplary answers to the most urgent challenges facing us today. The Prize is unique in that the Award is only the beginning of a long relationship between the Foundation and the Laureates as well as between Laureates themselves, in an effort to support sustainable solutions for social change.

The Foundation's statutes mandate that its purpose is to present the Right Livelihood Awards; to promote scientific research, education, public understanding and practical activities which:

- Contribute to a global ecological balance
- Are aimed at eliminating material and spiritual poverty
- Contribute to lasting peace and justice in the world.

The Foundation shall also support and report on the projects for which awards are presented.

According to the 7th Chapter, 17 § of the Swedish income tax law (1999:1229), the Foundation is exempted from taxes. The Foundation has a so-called 90-account and is financed mainly by donations from private individuals. It is also a member of FRII (The Swedish NGO Fundraising Council).

Management of the Foundation's assets

The Board decides the strategy for how the Foundation's capital should be invested. The German GLS Bank, which only offers investments approved by the bank's social and ecological criteria, manages the major part of the capital. The Foundation only invests a small percentage in stocks (2013-12-31: 12%) and a large part in bonds. The most important role of the capital is to serve as a buffer and security for the future, not to deliver the largest possible return.

The Foundation's assets are managed in four different ways:

866 715 SEK (previous year 0 SEK) is placed in the Swedish social and ecological bank Ekobanken with a settled interest of 2.25%.

13 794 280 SEK (previous year 12 038 128 SEK) is invested in bonds in Swedish kronor, rated AAA and Aaa, issued by the Swedish government, municipal lending institutions in Denmark, Finland and Norway, project finance institutions in the Netherlands and Germany, and Swedish mortgage lending institutions. The return 2013 was 1.64% (for 2012 it was -0.25%, but that only referred to part of the year).

6 423 213 SEK (previous year 5 218 391 SEK) is placed in EUR through GLS Treuhand in various companies with an ethical approach. The return 2013 (in EUR) was 3.4% (same as 2012).

2 830 392 SEK (previous year 3 352 189 SEK) is placed in SEB's global index based stock funds with an ethical approach. 2012 also included other funds. The 2013 return was 23.2% (previous year 8.5%).

Placements are, as in previous years, noted by their value on the balance sheet date. The change in value is in its total accounted for in the income statement

Since the capital is not sufficient for the Foundation to fund its activities from the return, the Foundation is continuously active with its fundraising efforts. In our fundraising, we seek to build a platform of annual private donors to cover the costs of the year and to secure the Award for the future through capital donations which are added to the foundation equity

Currencies

The Foundation mainly works in Swedish Krona, Euro and Swiss Franc, but also British Pound and US Dollars. During 2013, we have also worked in 10 other currencies. See the analysis, note 1.

Activities

According to the Foundation's organisation strategy for 2010-2015, the goal is to raise the prize sum, improve the protection for Laureates, invest more in educational programmes and develop our communication in order to reach an even broader public with information about the Laureates.

During the year, the Foundation was able to take important steps towards these goals: The total prize sum was raised from 1 298 000 SEK (3 x 50 000 EUR) in 2012 to 2 000 000 SEK (4 x 500 000 SEK) in 2013. We organised two important solidarity visits to threatened Laureates. Our university project, the Right Livelihood College, initiated cooperation with four new universities. We also hired two new press consultants (for Latin America and South Asia). On top of this, we arranged the first regional conference for Laureates from Latin America.

Despite these new activities resulting in more money spent – 7 811 218 SEK in 2013 compared to 6 441 664 SEK in 2012 – the Foundation was able to finance this increase with donations received during the year – 6 766 115 SEK compared to 6 427 021 SEK the previous year – as well as the return from our assets – 1 265 038 SEK compared to 659 869 SEK in 2012. The Swedish Foundation's result was therefore 219 935 SEK compared to 645 226 SEK the previous year.

During the year, the Foundation received a number of capital donations and aimed to build up the capital to a level to be able to plan work in a more long-term manner, and where the capital facilitates a much broader support for the Laureates. The largest donation was a house in Germany which we could sell for 12 937 600 SEK (1 450 000 EUR). Capital donations are directly transferred to the Foundation's equity. Mainly through such donations, the capital increased from 21 397 406 SEK in 2012 to 38 717 101 SEK in 2013 – an increase of 81%.

Major activities during the year

Choosing Laureates

Anybody can propose a person or an organisation for the Right Livelihood Award. For the 2013 Awards, we received and researched 94 proposals from 48 countries (2012: 122 proposals from 52 countries). The 11 individuals comprising this year's jury met 5-7 September to decide on the 2013 Laureates.

Laureates 2013

The Laureates were announced at a press conference at the Swedish Foreign Ministry's Pressroom on 26 September. **Paul Walker** (USA) received the Award for his tireless work on ridding the world of chemical weapons; **Raji Sourani** (Palestine) for his unwavering dedication to the rule of law and human rights under exceptionally difficult circumstances; **Denis Mukwege** (Democratic Republic of Congo) for his courageous work healing women survivors of war-time sexual violence and speaking up about its root causes; and **Hans R. Herren** (Switzerland) for his expertise and pioneering work in promoting a safe, secure and sustainable global food supply.

Award ceremony and Laureates' programmes

The Award ceremony took place in the Swedish Parliament on 2 December with the Deputy Speaker, Ulf Holm, and the Society for Right Livelihood Award in Parliament (SÄRLA) as hosts. During their individual programmes in Stockholm, the Laureates met with Foreign Minister Carl Bildt (Denis Mukwege and Paul Walker), EU and Democracy Minister, Birgitta Ohlsson (Denis Mukwege), Sida's Director General, Charlotte Petri Gornitzka (Raji Sourani), Church of Sweden's Archbishop, Anders Weiryd (Raji Sourani), the next Archbishop, Antje Jackelén (Hans R. Herren), as well as many journalists, parliamentarians, ambassadors and other relevant contacts.

The Laureates spoke at various public events arranged in cooperation with The Swedish Institute of International Affairs, UNA Sweden, Kvinna till Kvinna, Church of Sweden, Swedish Society for Nature Conservation, The Federation of Swedish Farmers, We Effect, the Swedish society for global organic food production, Ekobanken, Stockholm Resilience Centre, Sipri, The Swedish Ministry for Foreign Affairs, the Olof Palme International Center, the student association Pax et Bellum, the Association of Foreign Affairs in Uppsala and Lund, Law students' Association in Uppsala, The Workers' Educational Association/Stockholm, Jews for Justice for Palestine, The Palestine Solidarity Association of Sweden, Re:Orient, Ship to Gaza, Religious Social Democrats of Sweden, PMU Interlife, Weyler's publishing company, Swedish Postcode Lottery, Army Museum in Stockholm, Karolinska Institutet, indevelop, Läkarmissionen, Christian Democrats, Social Democrats, Filadelfiakyrkan, Akademibokhandeln, Domkyrkoforum in Lund, Lund University Center for Sustainability Studies, and The Swedish University of Agricultural Sciences/Alnarp.

After the Award ceremony in Stockholm, the Laureates participated in programmes in Oslo (Paul Walker), Lund/Hamburg (Hans Herren), Stockholm/Umeå (Denis Mukwege) and Stockholm/Uppsala (Raji Sourani). Hans Herren held this year's Right Livelihood Lecture at the University of Zürich.

The Award's impact for this year's Laureates

Paul Walker will use his prize money to expand the NGO-coalition supporting the Nobel Peace Prize Laureates, the *Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons*, OPCW, and the Convention against chemical weapons, as well as to strengthen the multilateral weapon control mechanisms such as the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty and the Biological Weapons Convention.

Raji Sourani said that, after the announcement of the Award, colleagues, former clients and others lined up outside his office expressing how happy they were about the Award – they felt that the Palestinians are not alone in the world, that there are people who understand what they are fighting for and that there is hope. "Even though states turn their backs to us, we can see how free people around the world express their solidarity."

Denis Mukwege is planning to use the prize money to strengthen the work and support at the Panzi Hospital. He believes that the Award is helping mobilise and create awareness of the suffering of the Congolese women. He believes that the international community is starting to put more pressure on those who are to blame for the conflict and sexual violence.

Hans R. Herren observes that the Award had led to large media interest in him and his work, both in Switzerland and internationally. "The Award money will go to Biovision's project *Changing Course in Global Agriculture*, with the goal to build sustainable and safe global food production. Through our experiences on the local level, showing that sustainable, organic farming methods are increasing the production, we can show that it is possible to produce enough healthy food for the world's needs."

Protection for threatened Laureates

We estimate that approximately 25 of our Laureates are threatened in their home countries for the work they do. The Foundation has initiated a protection project for these Laureates.

25 January 2013, Cícero Guedes was shot and killed in Rio de Janeiro. He was one of the leaders of the Landless Workers' Movement, MST (RLA 1991¹). In cooperation with MST, the Foundation arranged a solidarity visit to the province Pará, which is the worst affected region when it comes to environmental crimes and violence against activists. The delegation was made up of Raúl Montenegro (RLA 2002, Argentina), Angie Zelter from Trident Ploughshares (RLA 2001, UK) and our Board member, Marianne Andersson, as well as several journalists. The delegation participated as observers in a trial against three men accused of two earlier murders of MST members. In July 2013, it was announced that the person who had given the order to kill Cícero Guedes had been jailed and was awaiting trial. MST believes that the international attention, to which the Foundation contributed with the solidarity visit, was an important factor leading to the actual imprisonment of the suspect, as the impunity for such crimes is normally very high.

In cooperation with Swami Agnivesh (RLA 2004, India), the Foundation organised a solidarity visit to India in mid-October to support Sima Samar (RLA 2012, Afghanistan), Medha Patkar (RLA 1991, India) and Swami Agnivesh, all of who have recently received threats of various kinds. Our Board member, Monika Griefahn, along with two staff members as well as one journalist, formed the delegation. Sima Samar met with India's Vice President, Hamid Ansari – a very important contact with the Indian government for Sima Samar. The Laureates met several

journalists, had private meetings with diplomats from Sweden and Germany, participated in an inter-religious dialogue at St. Stephen's College and spoke at a public meeting for 300 threatened activists in Ranchi, Jharkhand.

During 2013, we updated our emergency protocols, which define how we should act in an emergency situation, for a number of Laureates.

Laureates' network

The most important backing we can give our Laureates, aside from the actual Award and the protection programme, is to ensure that they can strengthen and support one another. Right Livelihood Award Laureates are members of a wide international network of fellow Laureates who are in constant contact, with the opportunity to meet and exchange ideas and experiences, as well as support one another.

In July, we arranged our first regional conference for our Latin American Laureates in Bogotá, Colombia in cooperation with, and financed by, Church of Sweden with 16 Laureates participating. There were two days of internal meetings and a public meeting – "Creating an Enabling Environment for Civil Society" – one afternoon where around 100 persons participated from various organisations, universities and authorities. There was also a day of exchanges between the Laureates and civil society organisations in Bogotá.

During the year, smaller groups of Laureates met, for example at the International Convention of Environmental Laureates in Freiburg (March), the World Future Council Annual General Meeting in Bonn (June), the annual meeting Projects of Hope in Bregenz, Austria (November), and at the various meetings arranged by the Right Livelihood College (see below). Our Swiss support foundation arranged, among other things, a brown bag lunch in Zürich (May) about Sima Samar (RLA 2012, Afghanistan), and a programme in Bern and Luzern (September) for Maud Barlow (RLA 2005, Canada).

Laureates cooperated around several campaigns over the year – 82 Laureates and World Future Council members signed a protest when the World Food Prize went to Monsanto, and, when Russia imprisoned 28 Greenpeace activists and two journalists during a protest against Gazproms oil drilling in the Arctic, 77 Laureates and World Future Council members signed a petition.

Right Livelihood College

Right Livelihood College (RLC) started in 2009 with the aim of tying together the environmental and human rights movements with researchers working with issues such as social justice, sustainability and development. The network contributes to bridging the gap between the academic and activist worlds. Right Livelihood Award Laureates visit and lecture at the RLC campuses, and students and researchers have been able to get assistance from Laureates with issues within their area of expertise. For the Laureates, the cooperation is a good way to spread their knowledge and inspire the younger generation of academics.

Today, there are 7 RLC campuses on five continents: Penang (Malaysia), Addis Abeba (Ethiopia), Lund (Sweden), Bonn (Germany), Port Harcourt (Nigeria), Valdivia (Chile), and Santa Cruz (USA), with the last three added during 2013. The university departments finance all activities. In November, our Board member, Monika Griefahn, participated at the opening ceremonies in

Chile together with Manfred Max-Neef (RLA 1983, Chile) and in Nigeria together with Nnimmo Bassey (RLA 2010, Nigeria).

Over the year, RLC organised many activities, among them:

- A workshop on "Mobilizing for Change: Re-defining local decision-making and participation" at the Bonn campus (May) where Sima Samar (RLA 2012, Afghanistan), Monika Hauser (RLA 2008, Germany) and Ruth Manorama (RLA 2006, India) worked together with 16 PhD students from 12 different developing countries/regions.
- The "Youth Future Conference" in Bonn in September arranged by the Youth Future Project, a youth network closely linked to the Right Livelihood Award, in close cooperation with the autumn workshop of the Bonn campus. More than 100 young people from 40 different countries and 16 PhD students from 13 countries met Nnimmo Bassey (RLA 2011, Nigeria), Michael Succow (RLA 1997, Germany), Anwar Fazal (RLA 1982, Malaysia) and Tapio Mattlar (RLA 1992, Finland) to discuss 'the next generation of sustainability'. Since then, six young people have received support and coaching for their project ideas presented during the workshop.
- In June, the Foundation, in cooperation with the Lund campus and SÄRLA, arranged the second seminar in a series on "Global Food Security: A rights-based approach to agricultural technologies" in the Swedish Parliament with Louise and Percy Schmeiser (RLA 2007, Canada), Wes Jackson (RLA 2000, USA) and Shrikrishna Upadhyay (RLA 2010, Nepal). In connection to this seminar, we arranged a public meeting in Stockholm in cooperation with FIAN, Africa Groups of Sweden, Latin America Groups of Sweden, Church of Sweden and Forum Syd, as well as a research seminar in Oslo in cooperation with the cultural department of Voksenåsen, and a public meeting at the House of Literature in central Oslo. Riksbankens Jubileumsfond financed these events.

During the year a Kenyan researcher was awarded a PhD Scholarship from the Bonn campus (financed by the German Academic Exchange Service) and a German student received a scholarship from the campus in Lund, both of them for research about Right Livelihood Award Laureates.

Reporting about the Laureates

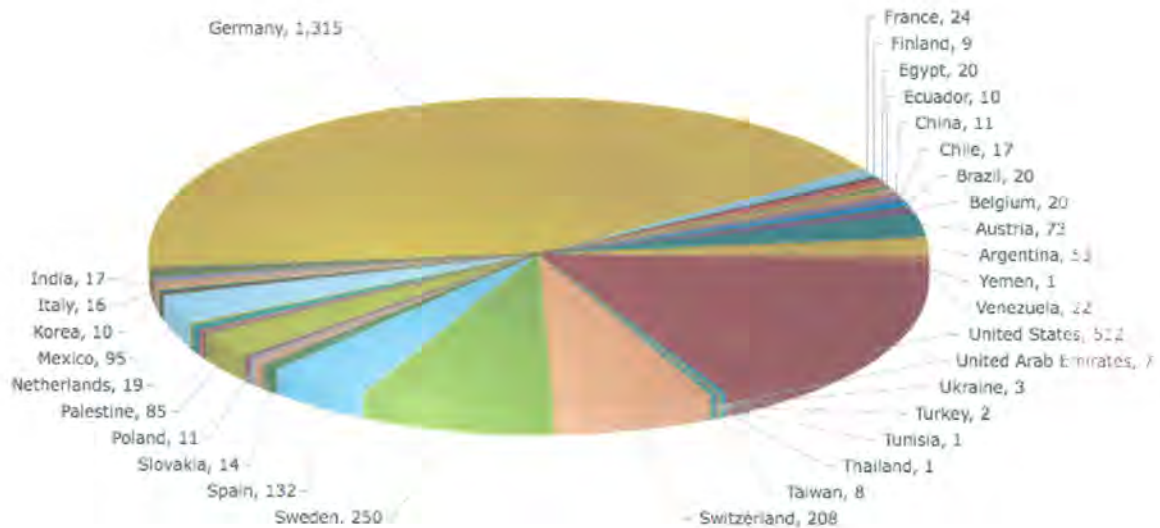
The most important channels for informing about the Laureates are the press and our website.

In order to better disseminate information about our Laureates, we extended our team of press consultants in Sweden and Germany with one for Latin America as well as a volunteer for South Asia (a few hours per month).

The media interest in this year's Laureates was good. In Sweden, articles were published on around 250 websites between the announcement and the end of the year. Good quality articles were published in newspapers such as Dagens Nyheter and Svenska Dagbladet. The Swedish public radio (for example 'Ekot') and Swedish public television and TV4 had good coverage of the new Laureates. They received a lot of attention also in their respective home countries and internationally, for example with longer coverage in German and Swiss TV and radio. The German Süddeutsche Zeitung published a debate article by Paul Walker. Associated Press wrote a long article in September and Agence France-Press published a long piece in December. The news agencies RIA (Russia) and Xinhua (Chinese) reported on the Laureates. In the Spanish/Portuguese speaking world, close to 300 articles were published on the web after the

announcement and in connection to the Award ceremony, despite the fact that there were no Laureates from these regions.

During the rest of the year, we sent out 28 press releases.

The solidarity visit to Brazil in April was very successful also regarding media attention; with close to 70 articles published, mainly in Brazil, but also in other parts of Latin America and Spain. The press work around the solidarity visit in India focused on lifting the profile of Sima Samar (RLA 2012, Afghanistan) and strengthening her connections with civil society and government in India, with good results in for example publicity in New York Times, Swiss radio, German TV (ARD) and the Gulf News.

Our website had between 13 000 (August) and 22 000 (December) visitors per month. We used our website as well as social media (Facebook, Twitter and YouTube) to provide regular information about the Laureates' work. At the end of the year, we had 6 500 followers on Facebook (2012: 5 000) and 950 on Twitter (2012: 500) with a Klout score of 61 (out of 100).

We sent out 11 Newsletters in English over the year to those who have signed up for it (around 2 000). In the Newsletter, we provide information on the Laureates successes, common campaigns and the Foundation's new projects.

The travelling photography exhibition about the Right Livelihood Award Laureates, "Backstage Heroes", produced by the German photographer Katharina Mouratidi, was well received, visiting in 2013 places such as Barcelona and attracting around 40 000 visitors.

Governance and administration

Board

The Board of the Right Livelihood Award Foundation consists of six members from Sweden, United Kingdom and Germany. The Board held their meetings on 18 May in Stockholm, Sweden and 5 September in Neuss, Germany. Trustees do not receive any remuneration. In a few cases, fees have been paid when Board members have carried out work relating to the selection process, support to Laureates and fundraising. For further information, see note 3.

Staff

The Foundation had four permanent staff during the year. Executive Director, Ole von Uexkull (the Founder's nephew), is directly responsible to the Board. He participates *ex-officio* in board discussions. The other permanent staff members were the Foundation Manager, Kajsa Övergaard (partly on sick leave during the year); Programme and Research Manager, Sharan Srinivas; and Outreach Manager, Steffi Geilhof. The Foundation also had three trainees during the year. Börje Andersson (former controller at a big Swedish company, now volunteer) carried out the book keeping and closing of the books. The presswork was managed by our Lead Consultant for International Communications, Birgit Jäckel, who had four press consultants (see above) with various forms of contracts to support her.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

Accounting Principles

Applied accounting and valuation principles are in accordance with the Swedish Annual Accounts Act (Årsredovisningslagen), statements and general advice by the Swedish Accounting Standards Board (Bokföringsnämnden), and FRIIs Governing Guidelines. Comparative figures for 2012 have been subsequently adjusted where applicable.

GLS Treuhand

From 2013 the management of the foundation's assets by GLS Treuhand has been included in the accounts. Comparative figures for 2012 have been subsequently adjusted. GLS Treuhand receives donations in Germany, which then are available for the foundation in Sweden.

The change described above has had the following effect on Net Result and Equity compared to the previous applied accounting.

Cash Flow Analysis

A cash flow analysis has been prepared for 2013. No such was prepared for 2012. The changed accounting principle from 2013 for funds managed by GLS Treuhand also means that an informative cash analysis can not be prepared retroactive for 2012.

Receivables

Receivables are valued at the amount with which they are expected to be settled.

Financial Fixed Assets

The foundation's securities are valued at the market value at the balance sheet date. Realized and unrealized changes in value are accounted for in the income statement under financial items.

Taxes

Right Livelihood Award Foundation is under the Swedish Income Tax Law (Inkomstskattelagen) (1999:1229) chapter 7 § 17 liable for tax only on income from property holding.

Donations

Donations are accounted for in the period in which the donation is handed over and then at actual value. Donations other than in ready money are valued at market value at the date of donation.

Capital Donations are donations aimed at building up the foundation's capital to a level where the work can be planned more long term and make possible a broader work for the laureates. Capital donations are accounted for directly to equity.

Purpose determined donations and grants are initially accounted for under a separate item under equity and are transferred to income as the activities referring to the donation or grant are carried through.





Report on the annual accounts

We have audited the annual accounts of the Right Livelihood Award Foundation for the financial year 1 January – 31 December 2013.

Responsibilities of the Board of Directors for the annual accounts

The Board of Directors is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these annual accounts in accordance with the Annual Accounts Act and for such internal control as the Board of Directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of annual accounts that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these annual accounts based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing and generally accepted auditing standards in Sweden. Responsibilities of the Board of Directors

The Board of Directors is responsible for administration under the Foundation Act and the deed of the foundation.

Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion with reasonable assurance on the administration based on our audit. We conducted the audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in Sweden.

As a basis for our opinion concerning discharge from liability, in addition to our audit of the annual accounts, we examined significant decisions, actions taken and circumstances of the foundation in order to determine whether any member of the Board of Directors are liable to the foundation. We also examined whether any member of the Board of Directors have, in any other way, acted in contravention of the Foundation Act, the deed of the foundation or the Annual Accounts Act.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinions.

Opinions

We believe that the Board of Directors have not acted in contravention of the Foundation Act, the deed of the foundation or the Annual Accounts Act.
